Feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord

"There are two days in the week upon which, and about which, I never worry - two carefree days kept sacredly free from fear and apprehension.

One of these days is Yesterday. Yesterday, with its cares and frets and pains and aches, all its faults, its mistakes and blunders, has passed forever beyond my recall. It was mine; it is God's.
