Fr. John Sullivan S.J. will be Beatified in Gardiner Steet
Church next Saturday.



The Chief Celebrant will be Cardinal Angelo Amate, Prefect of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints, assisted by Archbishop Diarmuid Martin.

In an unprecedented ecumenical gesture the formal request for beatification will be made jointly by Archbishop Diarmuid and the Church of Ireland Archbishop, Michael Jackson, reflecting that Fr. John was an Anglican for the first half of his life.

John O'Sullivan was born in Dublin on 8th May 1861. His father, the future Lord Chancellor of Ireland, was Protestant and his mother was a Catholic. He was baptised and brought up in his father's tradition.

In 1896 he made the momentous decision to become Catholic and in 1900 he entered the Jesuit order and was ordained in 1907. He was known for his life of deep prayer and personal sacrifice. He is recognised for his dedicated work with the poor and afflicted, spending much of his time walking and cycling to visit those who were troubled, sick and dying.

Fr. John died on 19th February 1933 and his mortal remains lie in a special shrine in Gardiner St. Church where people come to pray and leave petitions to Fr. John asking him to intercede for them with his prayers.
