As once again we are getting used to Lockdown and all that it entails, we think of everyone, especially those living alone, and wonder how you are coping. It is a strange and difficult time but thankfully we are beginning to see a "stretch in the evenings" and live in hope for better days ahead.

Masses continue at all the usual times, and are available on our webcam at www.stgabrielsparish.ie. The Church is open for private prayers every day after Mass until 4pm. We continue to deep clean and seal it regularly with our Fogging Machine. Hand sanitisers are available and please also use the wet wipes at each entrance to sterilize where you are going to sit, and again as you leave.



The Parish office is open for just two hours, 11am - 1pm, on weekdays for Mass cards and other business. You may leave a message on the phone at any time and we will respond on the next working day. Masks must be worn when visiting the office or sacristy.

In 1977 the bodies of three older people lay undiscovered in their homes in Dublin for several weeks. A young fireman, William Birmingham, who retrieved one of the bodies, decided to bring some humanity to the situation and began by printing posters offering help. Willie died tragically young in 1990 but ALONE (A Little Offering Never Ends) has continued for over forty years to tackle isolation, loneliness and homelessness in older people. They have brought about dramatic changes in society and continue to befriend and support thousands of older people.

This past year has brought new challenges and again ALONE has risen to meet them and have succeeded in becoming a main source of support and comfort to thousands of people feeling isolated and afraid during these strange and difficult times.
